XIII WORLD JAMBOREE

Japan, August 2 - 10, 1971

The XIII World Jamboree, the first Jamboree to be in Asia, will be the largest single international Scouting event ever conducted. More than 20,000 Scouts and leaders from 132 countries are expected to attend. The United States will be represented by about 3000 members of the Boy Scouts of America.

For Understanding, this theme was chosen in the belief that world brotherhood and the foundations of world peace can be strengthened through more understanding between people. The Jamboree through its programs and activities provides an unparralleled international opportunity to serve this purpose.

The 9-day Jamboree will be August 2 - 10, 1971. American contingents will be gone 20 days, taking in tours of Japan before and after the Jamboree.

Boys must be registered members of the Boy Scouts of America, 14 – 18 years of age, and have attained at least First Class rank or be a registered Explorer. The total cost of the trip is about \$825 for each boy.

The first U.S. contingent departs for Japan on July 23, 1971 for prejamboree tours. Contingents leaving later will split their tours of Japan before and after the Jamboree.

In Japan the Scouts will see the 2000-year-old civilization in cities like Nikko, Kyoto, Nara, and Koshigaya. Their tours will take them through some of the world's most beautiful gardens, ornate shrines and temples that were already very old when Columbus discovered America.

Modern Japan will be seen as the Scouts visit bustling Tokyo and ride the world's fastest train to the Jamboree site.

The emblem for the Jamboree is in the shape of a Sacred Mirror with the purple World Scout badge in its center and the words 13th World Jamboree, Nippon 1971. "Nippon" is the official Japanese word for Japan and the characters are Nippon in Japanese.

An Order of the Arrow Ordeal makeup will be held at Camp Osborn Friday and Saturday, September 18 and 19. The Ordeal will begin Friday at 5:00 p.m. and will continue until 11:00 p.m. on Saturday.

REPORT ON CAMP DEVELOPMENT

As a result of our capital campaign many improvements have been made at Camp Osborn, some are under way now, others will be made this fall and winter.

First was the complete replacement of all underground water lines; the old ones were the early plastic type that did not hold up. The new ones are also a larger size.

The dining hall has half of the porch closed in and screened to allow feeding more campers at the same time. New tables with plastic tops, and chairs given by the Naval Air Station add to the comfort and safety. The kitchen has a new one-piece vinyl floor, a new stainless steel triple sink and new cabinets.

Seven new Troop camps have been constructed, each with its own latrine and wash rack, with tent platforms and tents. The four on Horseshoe Ridge have their own well and camp.

The trading post has a new roof (the dining hall will re-roofed soon). Dining hall and health lodge have been painted inside.

A 250 foot long walking bridge across the creek and flood basin makes Horseshoe Ridge in easy walking distance of the dining hall and activity area. This was built entirely by volunteer labor.

The equipment storage building will be erected before September, and an open storage shelter will protect the tractors, mowers, boats, truck, tent poles, etc.

In the fall work should begin on our chapel. In late fall work will start on our 8-acre wilderness lake and two Troop camps on the southern end of the camp reservation. This will be one mile southeast from the Ranger's home. The road will have to be built up and a bridge or culverts put in to make it passable.

By next summer's camp, we shall have the chlorinating and filter plant for the pool, the new shower house at the pool and a new camp headquarters building.

Jan. 28 - Scoutmaster training, time and place to be announced.


Please put these dates that apply to you on your calendar and make plans to attend.



PHILMONT EXPEDITION

We now have nine Scouts who have made reservation for our Philmont Expedition next summer: from Albany: Bill Brooks, Terry Henderson, Dennis and Ricky Swartzell, Cole and Frank Powell, Robin Newcomb and John Knight; David A. Stone from Ft. Gaines.

Our group of fifteen Scouts and one leader will go with the Atlanta Council's Philmont group by chartered highway buses, departing from Atlanta. The fee from Atlanta and return is \$210.00. The group will be gone 21 days.

We have 6 places open at the time this is written. They could be taken quickly. We expect to select a leader for the expedition within 30 days. When we get the leader, the expedition date will be set to fit his vacation schedule.
