1971 SOAR PHOTO CONTEST

Scouts, enter your conservation Good Turn pictures in the 1971 SOAR photo contest! The contestis spansored by the Soil Conservation Society of America and the Boy Scouts of America, Enter one of these classes: Cub Scout - 8-10, Boy Scouts - 11-14, Boy Scouts-14-18, Explorers - 14-20.

Take pictures of any conservation Good Turn that boys and young men do during 1971 Project SOAR. Your pictures must show these things: 1. A conservation or environmental problem. 2. Cubs, Scouts or Explorers doing something about it. 3. The results of the Good Turn activity.

On the back of each picture print clearly in ink your name, address, age, and photo contest class. Include with your pictures a short story of not over 50 words to explain your conservation Good Turn pictures. If you enter a three-minute movie film, include this information at the top of the page of the short story to accompany the film.

Entries must be given to your Council Project SOAR chairman by Mayl, 1971. Council winners will be sent to state judges by June 1, 1971. State winners will be sent to national judges by July 1, 1971. National winners will be announced and displayed at the national convention of the Soil Conservation Society of America, Columbus, Ohio, in August 1971.

All acceptable entries will parm an attractive certificate of merit. Special recognition will be given council, state, and national winners.

If your picutre is named a winner in your local Scout council, you will need to furnish the original negative or transparency. You must also furnish a statement by each person that can be recognized in your pictures that he agrees to the use of the pictures for the purposes of illustration or publication in any manner.

All films, pictures, and slides will be returned. The project sponsors reserve the right to hold winning entries for one yar for display purposes.

The photo contest will be held again in 1972. Any pictures taken during 1971 Praject SOAR that were not entered in the 1971 contest may be entered in the 1972 contest.

After forty-one years as a Scout Executive, eight of them in Albany, I retire on March 31 and become a volunteer again.

In these forty—one years: In the Griffin council I had a part in acquiring, financing and building a 1700—acre camp, and left the money and plans to build a 14-acre lake and to purchase a camp for Negro boys. In Athens, I had a part in acquiring and financing their 330-acre camp in Rabun Caunty, including its development, acquired and developed 130 acre camp for Negroes, and started the Okefenokee Swamp Expeditions that at their peak had 761 attending.

In the eight years here at Albany, I started this DRUMBEAT on a bi-monthly basis, started the Okefenokee Expeditions, helped set up the capital campaign that will enlarge and renew Camp Osborn and has already purchased a two-acre lot and house that will become the council's service center. And we have reached a high rank in the quality of our Scouting program. Membership and finances have zoomed up and our finances have more than doubled. We have gone from four to five staff members.

Elizabeth and I shall live on in Albany where we have shared the friendship of a multitude of good people. We are grateful for all that you have meant to us and wish for you and the Council much success and happiness in the years ahead.

DEVOTED SCOUTER DIES

Hiram C. Comp, Agent for Standard Oil of Kentucky in Sylvester for more than three and a half decades and active volunteer Scouter for as many years, passed away July 19 after a long illness. Mr. Camp was Vice-President of the Chehaw Council and was considered one of our most devoted volunteers.

For many years he had seen to it that Sylvester carried its share of the council's operating cost, personally soliciting support from local business and individuals.

COUNCIL NEEDS 1200 BOYS TO ACHIEVE 1971 GOAL

The Chehaw Council achieved "On Target" status for the month of June in all seventeen items of the Baypower program. But, to stay on target for the balance of the year 1200 bays will have to be added to our units' membership rolls.

To be on target at the end of December we need to add It Cub Packs, 15 Scout Troops, 8 Explorer units, 590 C ub Scouts, 425 Boy Scouts and 185 Explorers. On quality items we need to add three trained leaders. We are already above end of year's goals on BOYS! LIFE and National Standard Units.

BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA ANNOUNCES RULES FOR PUBLIC SPEAKING CONTEST

Last year, the rules for selecting participants for the "Report to the Nation" were changed making public speaking a primary factor in selecting our outstanding Scout or Explorer. Each Troop or Post may have its own contests and nominate its winner for district competition. Winners on the district level advance to the council level and the council winner competes on the Regional level. The Regional winner gets an all expense trip to Washington. Trophies will be presented to winners of first, second and third places on Council, Regionof and National levels. In addition, the National winners will receive scholarships and the first place winner will be designated Boy Scouts of America Youth Representative for 1972. Eligibility Requirements: 1. Must be a registered Boy Scaut of Eagle Rank or must be a registered Explorer of Eagle rank or as an Explorer must have received recognition for outstanding service to his religious institution, school or community. 2. Be active in his religious institution, 3. Be active in his Troop or Post. 4. Must have reached his 15th birthday, but not his 20th by February 1, 1972.

The Advancement Committee will be responsible for district contests which must be held befar October 25. Results then submitted to council advancement committee for competition on or before November 15th. The Regional contest will be held before December 1.

Speeches must be prepared by the contestants, must be on the subject "Youth's Responsible Envolvement", and must be 5 to 7 minutes in length. Thirty seconds over the maximum time or under the minimum disqualifies the contestant.

Full details of judging on District and Council level are available from the Scout Office. Every unit with an Eagle Scout or Explorer meeting the qualifications should get involved and have its best speaker enter the contest. Watch for further word in this bulletin.

N.A.S.A. continues to amaze the world with its fantastic space exploration programs. At the timethis newsletter is going to press, two Americans are exploring the moon. In one short year the moon explorers have advanced from foot travel to a four wheel vehicle. Back home we continue to fight the small earth problems such as polution, boloncing the national budget and a soaring crime rate to mention only a few. It is a shame that we don't have the technological ability to solve our"earth problems" like we have the "moon problems".
