SUMMER CAMP AT OSBORN

The first week of camp will start Sunday, June 13, 1965 but if you do not make plans to attend immediately this date will mean nothing to you. Boys joined your Troop to go camping – not to attend weekly Troop meetings. It is the responsibility of the Troop committee and the Scoutmaster to make arrangements for their Troop to go on a long term camp. A meeting should be conducted soon to secure adult leadership that will attend camp with the Troop. Arrange for safe transportation to and from camp and develop a camp savings plan so every boy can attend.

The first week of camp will be from June 13 to 19, the second week will be from June 20 to 26, the third week will be from June 27 to July 3, and the fourth week will be from July 4 to 10. Additional periods will be added if reservations require it.

Camp fee will be \$15.00 per boy if leader attends and \$3.00 per boy fee is paid by March 1, 1965. Reservations after this date will be \$16.00 per boy. \$18.00 per boy is charged if adult leader is not in camp with the Troop.

In order to hold a particular camp site in any week, paid reservations equal to 75% capacity of the site must be paid. Cabin sites will hold 10 campers and lean-to sites will serve 16 campers. Reservation for sites and time periods will be on a first-come, first-served basis with paid reservations.



Trophies will be awarded to the winners, both on a council basis and on a regional and national basis. You may secure folders on this postal rifle match from the council office or from your district executive. Only Explorers may enter the match.

FINANCE CAMPAIGN

Each fall our council has its annual finance drive. In Albany, Americus, Edison and Tifton, united funds campaign for us. Everywhere else we have to do the job ourselves.

Why must we have a campaign for funds? The council is an independent service organization dedicated to helping institutions organize units, train leaders, promote advancement in rank, stage attractive activities and a summer camp and counsel with Scouts about their work. It was set up and operated by community leaders of our 15-county area to help institutions use the Scouting program to train their boys in citizenship and character.

Every institution names a representative to council membership. There are other members elected at large. These elect the council officers and executive board who actually carry out the council's program.

The executive board builds the budget based on council needs. It sets up the council service center which has two full-time and one part-time office girls. Here we keep the registration, advancement and training records on all members, and mail out the badges earned, prepare and print the DRUMBEAT, handle correspondence, etc.

The executive board employs the executive staff of five men (we have one vacancy) who help guide the 1200 volunteer Scouters who bring the Scouting program to boys. We are unable to pay well enough to keep our experienced and successful men from being "stolen" by other councils.

We have also two camps, one fully developed for summer camping. The budget pays for a camp Ranger who keeps the camp open all year round for the Scouts of our area.

The budget also provides the office rent, office supplies, postage, training supplies and all the many things needed to keep the council going.

SO----give your hearty support toward this campaign to raise the funds needed to bring the best Scouting program to more and more boys in our area.




