# RIFLE AND ARCHERY RANGES

Qualified instructors will teach these subjects. There will be a \$1.00 charge for the Rifle Range Safety Course. Personal rifles must be stored with Camp Program Director. Beginning and advanced field archery will be taught. A charge will be made for lost arrows or broken equipment.

# MOSKEETO (22 calibre skeet shooting)

As a special activity ogain this year we will open our Moskeeto Range. The charge will be six(6) shots for 25¢.

# ADULT LEADERSHIP

There MUST be an ADULT leader in camp with each Troop. This leader will not have to pay a fee provided there are at least ten (10) Scouts attending camp with him. With fewer than 10 boys the leader will pay a prorated fee. An additional leader may attend free with each additional ten Scouts, Plan NOW to get your leadership.

### PHYSICAL EXAMINATION

All Scouts must have a physical examination by a physician five to fifteen days prior to camp. Each Scout will be rechecked upon arrival. Forms will be provided through the council office upon receipt of reservations from Scoutmasters. Each Scout should be responsible for his own health blank, and should bring it with him to camp.

### INSURANCE

Since the Chehaw Council cannot assume liability for sickness or accident occuring at comp, we have made arrangements to take out for each boy, on behalf of his parents, an insurance policy with the American Income Life Insurance Company of Indianapolis, Ind., for a limited coverage.

### FOOD

Appetizing and wholesome foods will be served from the camp's modern kitchen. Mrs. Iva Adams, dietician of Camilla High School, will be our camp dietician again this summer.

### VISITOR'S DAY

Visitor's Day is Wednesday. Starts at 2:00 p.m. with a field and aquatic meet. Please bring a lunch basket if you plan to stay for the evening program. Sorry, we cannot feed any visitors in the dining hall because of limited space. After supper there will be the OR-DER OF THE ARROW CEREMONY AND TAP-OUT of candidates.
