- A. A special Roundup mug for leaders (Scoutmasters, Cubmasters, Explorer Advisors, Den Leaders, Webelos Leaders and their assistants and Den Leader Coaches.)
- B. A special Roundup patch for each new member.
- C. A Roundup patch with a special segment for the recruiter of a new member.
- For Scoutmasters, Cubmasters, Explorer Advisors, their assistants and Α. Den Leader Coaches to qualify for these recognitions they should:

SCOUT CAMPAIGN HAS RAISED MORE THAT 50% OF GOAL

George B. Plummer, Campaign General Chairman for the Total Development Fund, Chehaw Council, Boy Scouts of America, has announced the campaign has raised \$531,000.00 in pledges to date. This represents more than 53% of the \$995,000.00 minimum goal.

This minimum goal is committed to building new structures and renovating existing buildings at Camp Osborn in Worth County and to developing Camp Potter in South Dougherty County into a wilderness camp for weekend and holiday camping. The campaign will also be used to establish a \$200,000. Trust Fund to aid in the ongoing maintenance of Council Capital property and to supplement operating income.

Work on the two camps is required because of the growth of Scouting in the Chehaw Council. The Council now serves 4,850 youth members up from 3,352 in 1975. Past growth and further projections for growth make it mandatory that Camp Osborn be developed to serve a capacity of 1,200 Scouts.

Special areas will be developed for Scouts who are physically and mentally handicapped and an outpost camping area will be developed for Explorers and older Scouts.

Cub Scouts will benefit from the campaign through the construction of a picnic area for Cubs as well as a Father and Son overnight camping facility for the older Cubs known as Webelos.

The Campaign is scheduled to be active until the goal is reached and will solicit 36 month pledges from individuals, companies, corporations and other ganizations.

BOY SCOUTS RECEIVE GIFT

Dean Blackburn and Michael Rogerson managers of Hardee's Restaurants in Albany has presented the Chehaw Council's Scout Executive Bud Symmer a check for \$814.00 to apply to th overall sales of the 1981 Scout Fair held in Albany, Americus, Cordele and Tifton.

Local Scouts sold tickets to the Fair held this past April and for each ticket sold, Hardee's agreed to financially support the local Boy Scout Council with a gift. The Scouts sold over 16,000 tickets which was the largest number of tickets ever sold during a Hardee's promotion.

LIFE SCOUT ENABLES HOSTAGES TO ESCAPE

When James Vincent Lopez achieved the rank of Life Scout in Troop 4 of Holy Angel Catholic Church, Globe, Ariz., he didn't know that some years later the lives of five diplomats would depend on his Scout training.

On November 4, 1979, when Marine Corps Sergeant James Vincent Lopez stood guard duty alone at the United States embassy in Teheran, the embassy was attacked by a heavily armed mob. Sergeant Lopez single-handedly held

off the militants for 3 hours.

His action enabled the embassy staff to destroy secret documents and visa plates. His leadership permitted the escape of the five American diplomats who were secretly given protection by the Canadian embassy.

He as also credited with scrawling the slogan, "Viva la roja, blanca y azul" on the embassy walls. Since none of the militants knew Spanish, the slogan remained. The translation is "Long live the red, white, and blue."


DISTRICT CAMPOREE A BIG SUCCESS


