

SCOUTS NAME GEORGIA YOUTH AS WHITE HOUSE DELEGATE



A 16 year old Albany Georgia youth honored a year ago by the Boy Scouts of America for an act of heroism was named today as one of seven young adults who will present Scouting's Report to the Nation next month at the White house.

He is Freddie Hill, of 2000 Tompkins, a sophomore at Dougherty County High

school, and a member of Troop 101. The unit is chartered to United States Marine Corps Logistics Base Chapel, Albany.

If the pattern of former years continues, the youth will get a February handshake from the nation's President as part of Scouting's annual report to the Nation activities in Washington, D.C.. He also will participate in presentions before several members of Congress during programs which mark the 75th anniversary of the 4.7 million youth organization.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Edwards. He represents the Southwest Georgia Council, B.S.A., and the organization's Southeast Region.

A defensive end of his high school's varsity football team, the youth also competes in cross country and is a purple belt karate competitor. A telented artist, he recently was among a group of Georgia high students selected to attend a special program at Atlanta's High Museum. He also is active in Baptist youth group at the Marine base Chapel.

Scout officials note that Hill was honored this past year for his rescue of another Scout during a Troop Swimming program in Albany's Kinchafoonee Creek at its confluence with the Flint River in June 1983.

When flood gates were unexpectedly opened at the Lake Worth Dam near there, other boys were swept into the rushing water. Scoutmaster Howard Unruh and Hill dove into the stream. After Hill had towed one youth to safety, he then obtained a rope to assist the Scout Leader and the second boy who had reached shor but were trapped by and overhanging cliff.

For his efforts, Hill earned Scouting's Heroism Award. It is presented to youth and adult members of the organization, upon action by a national review board, to recognize "heroism in saving or attempting to save life at the risk of one's own."
