#### **Boy Scout National Jamboree** Information

Room is still available on the Council Troop roster for Boy Scouts wishing to attend the 2001 National Jamboree at Fort A.P. Hill, Virginia. Jamboree will be July 23 through August 1, 2001.

The major qualifications for joining this special Council Troop are:

- 1. The Scout must have completed the sixth grade or be at least 12 years of age and a First Class Scout by July 1, 2001, but not have reached the age of 18 by September 1, 2001.
- Have been active in a troop for at least 6 months prior to July 1, 2001.
- Be approved by his Scoutmaster and the Local Council.

The fee for the Jamboree experience is \$950. This fee includes the National Fee, transportation, pre-jamboree training weekend, tours, admission fees, 19 meals, lodging, etc. A payment schedule has been made and is already in progress.

A chartered bus will take the Council troop from Camp Patten on July 19<sup>th</sup> and return August 3<sup>rd</sup>. Tours will be arranged to Washington, D.C., the Capital, Smithsonian, Arlington National Cemetery and the Washington and Lincoln Memorials among other sites.

National Jamboree is an experience of a lifetime for a Boy Scout. The troop will consist of 4 Adult Leaders and 36 Scouts. Space is still available. Call or come by the Council Office for more details and an application.


It was a long, hot day for the volunteers, but hopefully they feel a sense of accomplishment, for they have begun something, which can be added to or continued to better our children's camp.
